


The truth about pixels

camera makers would have you believe that you need 24, 36 or even 40 megapixels to make high quality images. Not so! You may recall the first digital cameras that we used to bring along on our filed trips. They sported a whopping 2 or 3 megapixels and we made some great images.

An 8x10 print of best quality (300 ppi) requires only 6 megapixels. An 11x14 can be made from the same file with acceptable quality at 200 ppi. But the foregoing is without the magic of interpolation by Photoshop and other software. The truth of the matter is that an acceptable 11x14 prints can be made even with a 3 megapixel camera with careful composure so that cropping is not required.

Interpolation works by filling in missing pixel information with values based on the surrounding



pixels. There are a number of algorithms used for interpolation such as Nearest Neighbor, Bilinear and Bicubic the explanation of which is beyond the scope of this newsletter.

A downside to interpolation is the production of an undesirable artifact known as aliasing in which diagonal lines have jagged edges. Anti-aliasing removes these jaggies and gives the appearance of smoother edges and higher resolution. It works by taking into account how much an ideal edge overlaps adjacent

pixels. The aliased edge simply rounds up or down with no intermediate value,

whereas the anti-aliased edge gives a value proportional to how much of the edge was within each pixel.

The bottom line is that resolution of a final image is not limited to that of your camera sensor.

If your really serious about reso-

Perfect Diagonal Resampled to Low Resolution

lution, get yourself a roll of 120 Velvia and camera to put it in. You can achieve a resolution equivalent to about 313 MP. No software needed.
