



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Astrophotography

Tired of the same old? Ready to get out of your comfort zone?. Contrary to what you might think, you don't need new equipment to get started. Just the camera and tripod you already have and an hour or so on YouTube.



By popular demand, I won't get into the details, but hope you will be stimulated to watch some of the great content available on the internet.

the photography of celestial objects requires overcoming some inherent problems, among which are the very long exposures and Digital noise.

Long exposures are necessary to capture deep space objects but have to be kept short enough to avoid significant star trails.

If you decide to take the next step, a tracking mount that moves the camera

opposite to the Earth's rotation allows very long exposures with no motion blur. Absent a tracking mount, a single exposure will have to suffice. The maximum exposure time can be estimated by the rule of thumb, 500 Rule. Divide your focal length into 500 to find the exposure time.



You will need a high ISO, such as 1600 or 3200 depending on what you can get away with. Full frame cameras are usually better in that regard.


Without getting technical, three types of calibration frames are used to get a quality image: Bias Frames, Dark Frames, and Flat Frames. These are which are combined with **s**pecialized software such as "Deep Sky Tracker". Of course, it could be done in PS but with great effort and inferior results. Deep Sky Tracker is a free download.

Apps such as the photographers Epemera and Stellarium are available to assist in finding subjects, the best location and time. Have fun!

The Forgotten Filter

Processing software has eliminated the use of most physical filters. But there is one you should still use – the polarizer. in many situations, you will get

improved sharpness better color saturation and elimination of unwanted reflections and glare.



Polarization refers to light vibrating in a single plane as opposed to unpolarized that vibrates in all planes. Linear polarizers transmit light that is in alignment with the direction of a microscopic crystalline 'grid.' A circular polarization is more complex. It uses a

second element, the 'quarter wave retarder' behind the front polarizer, Light leaving the retarder is unpolarized and therefore does not interfere with auto focus and exposure meter sensors. Turning the adjusts the amount of polarized light transmitted to the camera lens.

A good circular polarizer is expensive, so it makes sense to buy one that fits your largest diameter lens and use step down rings to adapt smaller diameter lenses.

Using the filter is easy. As you look through the viewfinder, turn the filter to

Area of sky most effectively polarized with a Circular Polarizer:

Point your index finger at the sun. With your thumb extended at a right angle (90°), rotate it around the axis of the index finger. It will point out the band of deepest blue from horizon to horizon.

see the effect. You could leave a polarizer on the camera all the time, like a skylight filter to protect your lens. The problems are that you lose 1 to 2 f-stops depending on the amount of polarized light and there are times when glare or reflections are desired in the composition. An unconventional use, is as a 1 to 2-stop variable neutral density (ND) filter.

To avoid the hassle of constant readjustment, your lens should have a front element that does not rotate when zooming or focusing.
